In the summer of 2024, **Grace Schneider**, a junior at Marian Central Catholic High School, embarked on an extraordinary journey that would forever shape her understanding of leadership, community, and personal growth. Grace was one of the sixteen fortunate students selected for the prestigious Youth Community Leadership Program by Leadership Greater McHenry County (LGMC). This program, dedicated to nurturing the next generation of servant-leaders, offers an immersive experience that pushes its participants beyond their comfort zones and into the heart of their communities.

rogram with a Purpose The LGMC Youth Community Leadership Program is more than just a leadership course. It's an interactive class designed to cultivate a deep awareness of community needs while fostering servant-leadership qualities in its participants. Through a series of carefully structured events-ranging from leadership development days and government sessions to healthcare forums and nonprofit visits-the program provides an in-depth exploration of the challenges and opportunities within McHenry County.

Grace described the program as one that is deeply committed to "creating leaders" who are not only aware of the needs around them but are also eager to contribute to the betterment of society. The program's mission resonated with her from the moment she learned about it through Mrs. Diamond, the guidance secretary at her school.

#### The Journey Begins

The program's rigorous selection process ensures that only the most dedicated and



passionate students are chosen. Grace recalls her interview as a nerve-wracking but valuable experience -- one that tested her commitment to her school, community, and personal leadership goals. After a competitive interview process at her school, Grace was thrilled to be selected to represent her high school, marking the beginning of an unforgettable journey.

#### **Immersive Learning**

Over the course of several months, Grace and her fellow participants met once a month for various activities designed to challenge and inspire them. These sessions were far from typical classroom experiences. Instead, they involved guest speakers, interactive workshops, and hands-on activities that encouraged students to step out of their comfort zones. "They make you speak a lot," Grace admits, but it was this very challenge that helped her grow more confident in her voice.

One of the standout moments for Grace was the People in Need Forum, where participants were exposed to the myriads of issues facing their community. Additionally, a nonprofit fair allowed Grace to explore different organizations and choose those that resonated with her and her group. Her sponsor, Ms. Stacy, from "One Million Monarchs" (a nonprofit dedicated to supporting grieving teens), provided invaluable guidance throughout the program.

#### **Building Connections**

Networking was another significant benefit of the program. Grace fondly recalls the many people she met, each offering a unique perspective and insight into leadership and community service. The retreats were particularly memorable, not just for the learning



experiences but also for the camaraderie they fostered. Grace shares a humorous story about how her group once piled into an elevator and, on the count of three, jumped in unison—a moment that perfectly encapsulated the fun and bonding that the program encouraged.

#### Lasting Impact

The lessons Grace learned from the LGMC program extend far beyond the scheduled events. The program's emphasis on stepping out of her comfort zone and engaging with the community has had a profound impact on her daily life. She now approaches challenges with greater confidence and a strong sense of purpose, looking for ways to contribute positively to the world around her.

Reflecting on her overall experience, Grace notes that the program made her more aware of her surroundings and offered a fresh perspective on the community she's part of. "Everyone left involved in something else that they weren't involved in before," she says, highlighting how the program not only developed her skills but also inspired her peers to act in their own lives.

#### A Bright Future Ahead

As Grace looks to the future, she carries with her the invaluable lessons learned from the Leadership Greater McHenry County program. It's clear that this experience has set her on a path toward becoming a leader who is not just aware of the world's needs, but actively working to address them. In addition to the Illinois Seal of Biliteracy, Marian proudly announces the ability for its students to earn the Global Seal of Biliteracy, which enables those who earn the seal the ability to demonstrate, through testing, their language skills to any school or employer across the country. Both opportunities for the students to earn the Seals represent Marian Central Catholic's commitment to providing the resources for its students to succeed in life after high school.

"I was excited to launch our Biliteracy Seal program at the beginning of this year," said Mrs. Debra Cunico, Director of Curriculum and Professional Development. "After quite a few students have tested and achieved both state and global status already this year, I am even more certain that implementing this program for the students of Marian is extremely beneficial! I am looking forward to seeing this program grow and expand to allow for more heritage and second language learners to reap the benefits of their biliteracy as they continue their education and step into their careers."

As a college-preparatory school, Marian Central takes pride in developing graduates who are prepared to be well-rounded citizens of the world. The addition of the Illinois Seal of Biliteracy and Global Seal of Biliteracy helps Marian achieve this goal. The award is a statement of accomplishment that shows a student's hard work and preparation to enter society as a global citizen. Besides the initial benefit of being able to add the Seal to the student's college applications and resumes, the Seal encourages the students to think past their native language, developing empathy and an understanding for others. Lastly, the Seal represents the student taking responsibility and setting themselves up for success in their career in an interconnected world.

With this being the first year both Seals of Biliteracy are being offered, there has been a great response. Seven Marian students have completed their testing, and of those seven, five have already earned their Seals. Marian Central Catholic High School is excited to offer the Seal of Biliteracy, an opportunity for its students to continue to push the limitations and breakdown language barriers.

## The 2023-2024 McHenry County Male Athlete of the Year: **Christian Bentancur**

Christian Bentancur '24, a name known throughout the Marian Community, has become synonymous with athletic excellence. As a record-breaking football and basketball star, his journey to the top has been nothing short of remarkable. But beyond the accolades and the stats, Christian is defined by his unwavering faith, the strength of his family, and his commitment to being the best version of himself—both on and off the field.

#### Achievements That Speak Volumes Christian's athletic achievements are nothing short of extraordinary. In football, he graduated from Marian Central holding every single receiving record there is. For the state, he racked

up 3,867 IHSA career receiving yards, ranking him second in Illinois. He has a total of 51 IHSA career touchdowns, earning him the ranking of third. Lastly, he cumulated 231 IHSA career receptions, leaving him fifth in the state. On the basketball court, he has surpassed the 2,000-point mark, becoming Marian Central's all-time leading scorer. He is the only athlete in IHSA history to score over 2,000 points and have over 200 career receptions. "Having records in one sport is incredible, but having records in both sports is truly a blessing from God," he says, reflecting on his dual-sport success.

#### Memorable Moments and Milestones

One of the pivotal moments in Christian's high school career came during his freshman year, right in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic. "I was on the JV team for a while, until one day I got pulled up to see what I could do. I had to work harder than everyone else to earn a spot, which I eventually did," he recalls. It was a turning point that taught him the value of perseverance. Fast forward to his senior year, and Christian's season became a culmination of all the hard work and dedication he had put in. "Achieving all the records and having the season I did stood out the most to me," he reflects.

Marian's Award-Winning Author DONNA KATHRYN KELLY '86

When looking back at her time at Marian, Donna Kathryn Kelly thinks of the camaraderie of her classmates where she's created lifelong friendships. In reflection of her life during high school, she describes "Living in a northern suburban town in the mid-1980s was like living in a John Hughes movie. Life back then was all cornfields, camaros, heavy metal music, bonfires, and football games."

In retrospect of her educational journey at Marian, Donna recalls a couple of important people who left a lasting impact and helped her get to where she is today. She explains, "Yes, one educator stands out as a particular influence on my life and my writing career. In my senior year, my Spanish class instructor, Kathleen Ansley, made a point of recognizing my interest in literature, and lent me several Herman Hesse novels, including Steppenwolf and Siddhartha." This meant so much to Donna because the teacher reached out to her on a personal level and shared a common interest. This support from Kathleen furthered Donna's initial journey of becoming an author. Another figure at the time that Donna looked up to is the past principal, Thomas Landers. Donna saw him as a role model at that point in her life, and the years after she had graduated.

Donna was a voracious reader, which led to her interest in pursuing a career in writing. In the beginning, poetry was her

first love, which was greatly influenced by her relationship with her grandmother. Reminiscing about their relationship, Donna says, "My grandmother, Charlotte Costello, was a poet, and we typically would each read one of our poems aloud at holiday gatherings." From there on, Donna's love for writing continued. "I started composing poetry in spiral-bound notebooks when I was around eleven years old," she recalls. She has kept all the poems she wrote in her adolescence, including a love poem she wrote that appeared in the Marian newsletter in 1986. Fast forwarding to college, her writing flourished as she studied creative writing at Florida State University. She took workshop courses during her time there to enhance her techniques in areas more directed towards drama and fiction. This is the time when she took her writing abilities to the next level.

A typical day for Donna is working as an attorney, but she has ultimately reduced her hours to find more time to pursue poetry and fiction writing. She still works part time in the civil division of a state's attorney's office. "Limiting my legal-work hours has given me the opportunity to focus on my creative writing," she says. Her years of working as an assistant public defender have heavily influenced her writing, specifically, the concept of offender rehabilitation, which has been the underlying theme in all three of her books.

Donna has quite a few highlights in her career. As an appellate defender, a case she handled was featured in an HBO documentary, The Murders at Starved Rock; she appears exclusively in episode two of the show. In her success as an author her newly released novel, The Lion at the Falls, was a 2024 finalist for the Killer Nashville Clayward Award. The story also won third place in the 2024 West Virginia Writers' Competition. In her free time, Donna is found working on her two new novels, one being a suspense novel that follows a judicial candidate who is running against the daughter of a professional football player, and the other being a political thriller involving a salon owner who is the target of a corrupt federal investigation. The working title for that one is The Insurrections of Thornwood Lane.

To many, writing is a craft, a form of art using words to create a story and letting the reader create pictures in their mind. Donna's journey and works exemplify her love and passion for writing. Reflecting upon her own journey, Donna's advice to any young author would be "to put the internet down, read a book, and don't stop – even when you start your writing career. The best writers are the ones who read regularly."

## **Celebrating Our Alumni Authors**



Reflections on Faith, Legacy, and the Journey to "The Pivotal Pastor" In 2022, DAVE KENNEBECK '63 found himself on an unexpected path—a path that culminated in the publication of his first book, *The Pivotal Pastor*. His journey of self-publishing was born out of love, loss, and the desire to honor a man whose spiritual leadership profoundly shaped his community. The book is dedicated to Fr. Ron Lewinski, who passed away in 2017. His ministry, vision, and role as the "pivotal pastor" of his parish inspired Dave to tell his story.


Initially, he wasn't sure he would be the one to write it. The idea began forming in 2017, but it wasn't until Easter of 2018 that Dave seriously started his research. Life intervened, and with the arrival of COVID-19 in 2020, his progress came to a halt. But in 2022, with the 20th anniversary of the dedication of their new church looming, he felt a renewed urgency to finish the project. That year was a whirlwind of writing, editing, and learning new skills like graphic design and page composition. His background in IT, entrepreneurship, and the work ethic instilled in him by his education at Marian Central Catholic High School gave him the tools he needed to self-publish.

Reflecting on his career, Dave realized it was never publishing that drew him in. His professional life revolved around IT, with long tenures at companies like NCR and AT&T. Along the way, his entrepreneurial spirit led him to diverse ventures—from independent IT consulting to running a children's theme party business called "Let's Pretend" with his wife. But no matter the career, the foundational values he learned through his Catholic education at Marian were always with him, guiding every decision he made.

When thinking about his experience at Marian he states, "It's interesting to think about how Marian shaped me, not just in terms of academics but in my worldview. The faculty at the time set high expectations for us, and the overall experience was far superior to what many of us would have had in public school." The morals and ethics that Marian instilled in Dave continued to shape his professional and personal life. These values inspired him to take on the challenge of self-publishing The Pivotal Pastor. Though writing the book was outside his usual scope of work, he found that all his prior experiences contributed to its completion. Dave explains, "Being the author, editor, photographer, and designer for the project was demanding, but also deeply fulfilling."

Dave says, "One of the most meaningful aspects of writing The Pivotal Pastor was reconnecting with the community that Fr. Ron Lewinski served so faithfully." During his research, he interviewed many people who had been influenced by his ministry, including Fr. Don Senior, a well-known biblical scholar who passed away shortly before the book's publication. His memories, along with those of others, helped Dave paint a fuller picture of Fr. Ron's legacy.

"In retrospect, I see how God has blessed my life in countless ways—ways that I often didn't fully recognize until years later. Looking back on the twists and turns that brought me here, I feel immense gratitude for the foundation that was laid at Marian, for the people who shaped me along the way, and for the chance to tell the story of a pastor who, in his own way, shaped so many others."

From Marian to the NFL, from the NFL to Retirement: The Journey of Bryan Bulaga '07 hen Bryan Bulaga looks back on his journey so far, one of the first things that comes to mind is his time at Marian Central Catholic High School. For Bryan, Marian was more than just a place to get an education; it was where lifelong friendships were formed and where he learned the values that would

"It was a great experience," Bryan recalls. "The community at Marian was small and tight-knit, and that's what I loved about it. You knew everybody, and that created a strong sense of belonging. It was a place where the structure and faith-based education really left a mark on me. As a father now, it's an experience that I want my kids to have."

Bryan's love for sports began as soon as he could walk. Growing up in Illinois, he played every sport the seasons allowed, but by eighth grade, football had captured his heart. As he entered high school, his talent on the gridiron began to shine. By his sophomore year, he was starting on varsity—a pivotal moment came when he made a gamechanging interception during a playoff stretch against Byron. "That play was a wakeup call," Bryan says. "It made me realize my potential in football."

Playing alongside his older brother and his brother's friends, Bryan found himself not just excelling on the field but also growing socially, building relationships with older teammates who would guide him both on and off the field. "Football wasn't just about winning games. It was about forming bonds with my teammates, and those bonds are something I still cherish today." guide him through the rest of his life.

Family played an enormous role in Bryan's development. His parents, Joe and Kathi, were his biggest supporters. He attended Marian with his older brother, Bill '05, and younger sister, Kim '09. "Having my siblings there was vital to the person I became," Bryan reflects. "My family was my biggest support system." The coaches at Marian, including Coach Brucker, Coach Dirk '93, and Grandpa Stanger, were like extended family. "They kept me on the straight and narrow," Bryan remembers. "They didn't just care about my performance on the field—they cared about the kind of person I was becoming."

s Bryan continued to excel in high school, his dreams of playing professional football began to seem more possible. By his junior year, it became clear that college football was in his future, and by his sophomore year in college, he started to believe he could make it to the NFL though the idea of being a first-round draft pick was not in the script!

That dream became a reality in 2010 when Bryan was drafted 23rd in the first round of the NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers. He went on to have an illustrious career, spending nine seasons with the Packers and two with the Los Angeles Chargers. In his rookie season, Bryan won Super Bowl XLV with the Packers—a moment he describes as one of the highlights of his career.

Bryan feels nothing but gratitude when looking back on his NFL journey. "I loved every minute of my playing career," he says. Among the immense success he found, and many wins he and his teammates achieved, "the trials, the injuries, the not so good days—that's all a part of sports and my story. It's about the bounce back, the resilience. I'm extremely grateful for the relationships I built and the opportunities I had."

In 2019, Bryan had the opportunity to return to the Packers for one more season under a brand-new coaching staff. Bryan is grateful he was welcomed back with open arms from Head Coach Matt LaFleur and his coaching staff. Bryan describes 2019 as "one of the most fun seasons I played in the NFL." Officially, in 2021, Bryan retired as a Packer, a decision that meant the world to him. "The Packers felt like home," Bryan says. "I grew up there. I was 21 when I first joined the team, and over the years, I got married, had two children, and experienced life as a Packer. It was an honor to wear that 'G."

#### Today, Bryan is enjoying life after football with his wife, Abbie, and their two children, Declan and Cameron.

A typical day involves getting the kids ready for school, fitting in a workout, tending to their property, and taking the



kids to their sports practices. "I love being involved in my kids' sports," Bryan shares. "There's nothing more fulfilling than watching them play, especially since my wife, Abbie, and I are like their full-time Uber drivers!"

In his free time, Bryan enjoys golfing and maintaining his property—particularly cutting the grass, which he finds oddly therapeutic. "I'm a big fan of keeping the landscape in check," he laughs. High school was one of the most fun times in my life, and the friendships and bonds you made are unbelievable. There's no purer form of sport than in high schoolyou're playing for the love of the game, for your teammates, and for your school. Don't add pressure to yourself. Just enjoy it and make the most of it."

Bryan Bulaga's journey from Marian to the NFL is more than a story about football; it's a story about the power of community, family, and perseverance. It's about the lessons learned on and off the field and the importance of staying grounded, no matter where life takes you. Simply be grateful to experience life and don't miss the important moments.

## THE MARIAN MENTOR PROGRAM

When Marian sees a need, we respond accordingly. The Mentor Program was founded in 2006 as a part of our school's improvement program. Shepherded by former Marian administrators Mrs. Loy and Mrs. MacCready, the program was designed to address the challenging transition freshmen face when entering high school.

raditionally, the shift from being top dog in middle school to the underdog of high school was marked by hazing and lack of support for freshmen. It was right of passage for upperclassmen to give freshmen a hard time and created a division in the school. With that, Marian set out to transform this experience by fostering a welcoming environment where every new student could thrive.

Initially, the program was a collaboration between Mrs. Loy and Mrs. MacCready until 2012, when changes in staffing brought forth new leaders, such as Mrs. Littner who runs the program today. The Mentor Program evolved to include a variety of support structures aimed at easing freshmen into high school life. Today, every freshman and transfer student are paired with a mentor, a dedicated upperclassman who provides guidance and encouragement.

The program's impact is evident in numerous ways. Freshman orientation, picnics, advisory visits, handwritten letters, and private checkups are just a few of the events organized to make the students feel at home. Additionally, mentors are involved in sixth and eighth-grade visits, sending welcome postcards, and even participating in social gathering events for middle schoolers to prepare them for the transition.



One touching example of the program's success is the story of an administrator's daughter. During a football game, she was unaware of the theme and felt out of place and embarrassed, until a mentor stepped in and invited her to sit and cheer with the seniors. This simple gesture of kindness highlights how mentors foster genuine connections and help all students feel included.

This program reflects Marian's Catholic mission by embodying a spirit of service and community. It has not only supported freshmen, but also inspired many former mentors to return as staff or even go into religious life, continuing the cycle of giving back. The relationships the mentor program helps create can last a lifetime. My brother, Jack Schneider '17, says he is "lucky to have found the one in Marian's Mentor Program," as he met his wife of one year, Katie (Littner) Schneider '18, in the program.

Despite the challenges mentors face, balancing their responsibilities while supporting others, the program cultivates essential leadership skills and a sense of familial support. At Marian, we live by our commitment to act as a family, and the Mentor Program is a testament to our dedication to ensuring that every student feels valued and supported from day one.

# Faith, Trust and Joy

Highlight Sister Faustina Marie's Profession of First Vows

With radical trust, joyful radiance and resolute faith, Sister Faustina Marie of Our Eternal Father took her first vows as a Poor Clares nun. The Eucharistic Liturgy for the Rite of First Profession was held on Saturday, July 13, at the Poor Clares of Rockford Corpus Christi Monastery Chapel. Sister Faustina Marie, formerly **Morgan Litterer '17**, had attended St. Mary Church in Huntley.

Father Nicholas Federspiel III, chaplain for the Poor Clares, was the principal celebrant of Mass, joined by several diocesan priests and deacons. In his homily, Father Federspiel contended, "The vows you make today draw upon your power to be a graceful nun. Grace is a favor or kindness expressed to the undeserving and is precisely what was given to us by Jesus's death on the cross. Grace and truth come through Jesus. Peace will be experienced in your home with your fellow sisters as grace is given."

In making her first vows as a Poor Clare nun, Sister Faustina Marie is roughly one-third of the way through a nine to 12-year formation process that starts with candidacy. In this stage, a young woman is introduced to the Poor Clares way of life and is challenged to distance

herself from the familiar. During the time of postulancy, Poor Clares practices are further explained, and the young woman is guided deeper into her faith journey.

As a novitiate, she becomes a member of the Poor Clares monastic family, receives her habit, religious name and intensifies her fidelity to Christ. She further detaches herself from worldly ways by contemplating vows of poverty, chastity, obedience and enclosure.

Sister Faustina Marie, in professing her first vows, is considered a juniorate nun, which is the final stage of initial formation. During the Rite of First Profession, her white habit was replaced with a black one, and she received a knotted cord to wear around her waist, symbolizing the Poor Clares vows of poverty, chastity, obedience and enclosure. A crown of greens commemorating St. Clare was placed on Sister Faustina Marie's head during the ceremony, and she was presented with two prayer books, the Rule of St. Clare and The Liturgy of the Hours. She will renew her first vows annually for at least five years before making solemn vows.

Years of prayer, discernment and a willingness to trust the Holy Spirit's call to religious life are the hallmarks of Sister Faustina Marie's faith journey. "My vocation story began at Marian Central Catholic High School," she said. "I was baptized but knew nothing about God before taking freshman theology class at Marian. This was the first time I truly encountered God and started to consider the deep questions of 'Who am I?' and 'What is the point of life."

"Once I realized that Jesus loves me, He is a real person in my life, and it's not just about doctrine, I began to wonder about the plan for my life," Sister Faustina Marie recounted. She became acquainted with the Poor Clare nuns in Rockford after doing a school assignment on their unique way of life. "Initially, I thought these nuns were crazy to live a life of poverty, chastity, obedience and enclosure, but gradually, God kept drawing me back to the Poor Clares through the St. Therese Vocations Camp and visits throughout high school."

During her time at Franciscan University of Steubenville, Sister Faustina Marie felt God was calling her to the cloistered life, "It was, and it still is, mysterious to me why God would call me to this life, but there is a profound paradox of living the vows of a Poor Clare nun. We give up things of the

world to be all-encompassing in our vocation and embrace the whole world in prayer and sacrifice."

As a contemporary young woman, Sister Faustina Marie has used computers, cell phones, and social media during high school and college, which she will not access as a Poor Clares nun. "Not having communication with family and friends is very hard because I grew up in a loving, normal family environment with lots of activities and social gatherings," she said. "I know being a cloistered sister is my vocation, but the difficulty of missing my loved ones is always there. In deepening my faith, I draw upon God's strength and know I am always in union with them."

Sister Faustina Marie's mother, Laura Litterer, her cousin, and her grandmother attended the ceremony. "It was a beautiful and sacred moment for my daughter. I struggle with the rule of enclosure that she must take, but I know she has the love and support of her fellow sisters and Mother Dominica. Sister Faustina Marie has a level of faith that we will never understand, which must be what sustains her in the religious life."

Sister Faustina Marie received the title 'Our Eternal Father' as a tribute to her late father, Eric Litterer, who passed away from cancer in 2015. "My vocation story is defined by everything that's happened to me, and losing my father at 16 impacted my life. I'm amazed at how God used my father's death and worked through

I chose the title of Our Eternal Father because God is the Father of all humanity and brings us together as a family like my father did."

Poor Clares abbess, Mother Dominica Stein, also sees great faith in Sister Faustina Marie's vocation. "She is very prayerful, loves our Lord very much and desires to give herself to Him. She is very well-rounded in her spiritual development, desires to learn more about her faith and is growing in a beautiful way."

Sister Faustina Marie summed up her calling to religious life with a quote from Saint John Paul II, "It is Jesus that you seek when you dream of happiness...It is He who stirs within you the desire to do something great with your life, the will to follow an ideal and the courage to make the world more human."

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
